Roksana Czech, a 14 year old junior from ClubSport in Pleasanton has fallen in love with racquetball, practicing every day and playing anyone who will get on the court with her. Roksi (as we affectionately call her) emigrated from Poland a mere 2 years ago, and spoke not a word of English when she got here. She found something in America that she could not experience in her homeland— competitive sports.

Since arriving, she has played freshman volleyball at Foothill High School in Pleasanton and very recently discovered racquetball, the new passion of her life. In Poland, Roksi said that girls are not offered sports as either recreation or competition and her only exercise in that country was swimming. The new freedom she has found competing in racquetball and volleyball has brightened her life and broadened her horizons.

After only 2 weeks of playing racquetball, she participated in the ClubSport Open racquetball tournament over the May 13-15 weekend in the junior beginners flight winning 2 matches

and losing 2 matches. Not only did she play in this tournament, she volunteered 20 hours of her time over the course of the 3 days recording scores, refereeing junior matches and helping the tournament staff in every way she could.



By the time you read this article, Roksi and her family will have relocated to Orange County in Southern California. She is already researching health clubs with racquetball courts and racquetball programs that she can join as soon as she moves and promises to keep us up to date on her racquetball training and playing.

Go to the USRA web site: USRA.org, then go to the **Member Login**. Provide your membership number to get your password.

From here you will be able to change your address, correct personal information and view your competitive history.

If it is time to renew your membership, then go to the **Activate your Membership** tab, provide your membership number or search by your name. If you have been a member sometime after 1996, you are already in the database. Update your personal information and renew your membership.

This new system is really the cornerstone for the new rating system and the tournament draw program that will

be used for all sanctioned events in the very near future.

No more wondering if your membership has expired and whether you'll need to bring the extra money to renew. With the new tournament program, most entries will be taken on-line with membership verification or application built in to the entry form. Rankings/Ratings will be stored in your membership file, which will save you from having to search for your name in the National ratings data file.

This new three-pronged system will finally bring this great sport into the 22nd century and allow it to take its place as one of the best and well-managed competitive sports.

The USRA deserves our support and applause for this huge undertaking.

The CSRA, and its Board of Directors, and Associate Members are sad at the sudden loss of our dear friend, Clyde Barker. We send our condolences to his immediate family. Shyla, his wife, and his two children, Andre and Rashaan, and countless friends.

Here are a few of the many letters and testimonies to his life. We hope that they will bring you comfort at this time.

I started playing racquetball about 13 years ago at 21st Point in Mountain View. A friend and a fellow player watched me play, and after careful observation of my serves and backhand, he strongly suggested that I take some lessons. That's when I met Clyde. I started with a package of 5 lessons. But over time, after playing with him and talking with him, I realized that he was much more than just an instructor to me. He was a gentleman, a beautiful spirit, a confidant, a friend, a rock of encouragement, a smile when times were bad, a laugh when things got rough, a word of wisdom when everything seemed to spin out of control, a prayer when I was desperate. Often times I just wanted to talk to him and be in his company. He was my friend, my coach, and my support. He taught me so much more than just racquetball – he taught me about life. When I was afraid, he showed me how to be courageous, when I was defeated, he taught me how to rebound and get back into the game – both on the court and in life. And when I was discouraged, he always would hold me around the shoulders, look me straight in my eyes, and convince me that I was so much more than I thought I would ever be, and that I could do anything I ever wanted to do. He would always tell me how proud he was of me, no matter the scores, no matter the outcomes, he was always proud of me, and that has made all the difference to me - as a player and a person.

There will never be another Clyde for me in my lifetime. That hurts me so

much, because he and I could talk about anything, and right now I really need to talk to him about how badly I feel that he is no longer here, and how much I miss him.

We have already talked about my Clyde story, but it is so special to me. For years, Clyde rarely called me Ruby. He always called me "Ms. Braxton", on the phone and in person - it was so funny. And of course you know about his phone messages. "Hello Ms. Braxton, this is Clyde....[at end of message] "This is Clyde. Goodbye." It's as though I'd forgotten who I was talking to all during our conversation. Another thing. Every year he called me up and sang "Happy Birthday" to me on the phone. What was funny is that he'd forget when my birthday was. I'm a November baby. However, I've picked up the phone in June to hear his fun rendition of "Happy Birthday" to me. One year I got 3 birthday calls. But I was so glad and honored to get every call, just as long as I didn't get any older J. And I'm glad that I told him that.

It was awesome looking at all of the beautiful faces of his friends, family and colleagues at Clyde's homecoming ceremony. He touched so many people, and we all deeply loved him so much. He is now in heaven with God. His physical presence will be missed, but I will always carry him in my heart. As I wrote to one of our mutual friends, "God, take great care of our friend. Clyde's now in heaven teaching all of the angels how to serve."

Clyde cared more about people than things; and cared more about how he treated people than what people thought about him. This aspect of his personality was what enamored so many of us to him. I learned a lot from Clyde about humility - being non-judgmental, maintaining quiet strength and simple goodness, and paying attention to the things that matter in life.

The truth is, any and all time spent with Clyde was special—that was just part of the deal. Clyde was my coach and my friend, and I miss him very much.

Mentoring and Racquetball

I'm currently participating as a mentor in a mentoring program and thought that I'd share a little bit of my experience in the hope of encouraging you to become a mentor.

Mentoring programs show kids that someone cares; something that each child needs to know if they are to develop emotionally and socially. Children look to role models to help them face the future. Mentors can be a positive example, something many children seek.

Mentoring may be easier than you think because your role is not to be a counselor or psychiatrist, but just someone to hang out with, a role model, or for at-risk kids, just a friend to get the child out of a stressed home environment for a couple hours.

Racquetball and mentoring seem to be a pretty good match. Although there's no guarantee that a mentee will even like racquetball, it's fortunate that racquetball is an almost instantly addicting sport. I play racquetball weekly with my mentee and I found it to be an easy way to remove barriers between myself and him.

My mentee has gotten good enough to win a couple of local junior tourneys but of course you have to exercise a lot care about putting a mentee into a pressured situation such as a tournament. It takes some judgment to figure out what is the exact level of challenge that they are ready for. I play so many tournaments that I decided that I would start taking him with me so that I could spend more time with him. When first starting out, I set pretty low expectations. I originally only entered him in round robin tournaments so that he would be assured of playing several matches. The first goal was just for him not to give up in the middle of the match, which he wanted to do. Next tournament, while he was losing badly, so I told him I would give him a dollar for

every point he made. It worked to keep his spirits up as he switched from focusing on his loss, to the money that he was making off of me. Now, he loves going to tourneys with me, meeting friends that he's made a previous tourneys and just hanging out at the clubs watching great matches.

The good thing about hanging out with your mentee at racquet clubs is that there are other supportive adults around, he can learn how to get along in social groups by watching how you socialize, and it's a safe environment in which to let him play with other kids. You're both having a great time without having to work at it.

The State of California has simplified things by approving almost 400 quality mentoring programs. The programs range widely, from those where you help kids with their

homework, to working with at-risk children. The mentoring organizations are especially short of men volunteers.

Kids in the mentoring programs are there only because they have chosen to have a mentor, so it's good to know that it's a decision that they've made themselves and not forced into it. 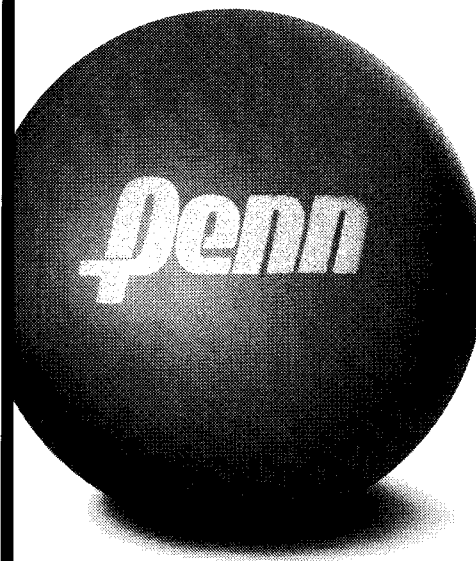

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Letter to the Members

Dear CSRA Members:

The CSRA came into existence in March 2002, as a result of the old organization, CARA, going dark after its funds were exhausted in defending itself against a lawsuit brought by Garry Carter. It is a matter of public record that Garry Carter sued the CARA and five former CARA Board Members: Peggine Callahan, Jack Hughes, George Tellez, Barbara Tibbens and Darryl Warren for “defamation” when he was sent a private letter from the Board politely disinviting his volunteer services in any official capacity, owing to some complaints that the Board had received about him. Over the next four years, Mr. Carter, acting without an attorney, stubbornly refused to let go of his lawsuit, even though it had no legal merit and was unwinnable in court.

During the course of the litigation some Board members were able to make monetary settlements with Garry Carter, which relieved those Board members of the burden and cost of going to trial. The pretrial motions, depositions and procedures were numerous and extremely costly for the remaining defendants, namely Jack Hughes.

There was also the matter that Garry attempted on several occasions to bring the CSRA into the legal entanglements, which would have also destroyed the CSRA as well as CARA, although on each occasion the motions were denied. Nevertheless, the CSRA was required to defend itself from these attacks at substantial cost to the organization. To date the CSRA has incurred over \$10,000 in legal representation and defense costs, in addition to CARA's having spent close to \$15,000 prior to its demise.

The damage to the reputation of the old racquetball association and the time spent agonizing over the appropriate response to the meritless lawsuit were all completely unnecessary and an unfortunate waste. The amount of money spent between the old organization and the CSRA could have gone towards racquetball related development in California, and this is one of the primary reasons that the CSRA has not been able to aggressively develop racquetball related efforts in California. The amount of money we are talking about would have been the combined annual budget for several state organizations — money that the members have paid to support racquetball — not to pay for a legal defense against unsupportable accusations of an unhappy person who has doggedly pursued a volunteer organization and one of its stalwart supporters — Jack Hughes.

Jack has had to spend a sizable amount of his own money to defend against the baseless and reprehensible accusations made by Garry Carter in his suit—all over an action taken by Jack merely as a Board member (merely signing the letter).

Not only was the Judgment in this case a complete victory for Jack Hughes, but the Judge made her decision after two days of Garry Carter's attempting to present some sort of meritorious case — without the defense having to make any presentation! In other words, Mr. Carter failed at trial to present even a shell of

a case, and the Judge promptly threw his lawsuit out of Court without the defense having to present anything!

But Jack was still required to pay for legal representation, consultation, trial preparation, depositions, etc., as well as bear the burden of the time and mental suffering of the four years of this nonsense. All the while, Jack has continued to perform his CSRA responsibilities and continue supporting the sport to which he has given a substantial portion of his life and effort.

If there were anything that we would like better besides putting this lawsuit behind us and getting on with promoting the sport of racquetball in California, it would be to find some way to assist Jack with the unfair financial burden he has personally incurred. To that end, we would like to announce the establishment of the **Jack Hughes Legal Fund**.

We have made every effort to conduct the organization's business in a professional manner, and that is why, up to now, there has been little public comment regarding the progress of the lawsuit. Now that it is over, we wanted to take this opportunity to clear the air. We want to take a moment to thank all of the members of the CSRA. This is the greatest sport to play and pass on to our kids. Hopefully we can all remember that it is just a game.
